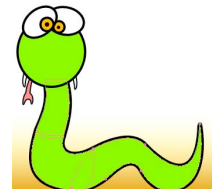
In January 2011, my husband Vito was diagnosed with pneumonia, a complication from his 7 yr battle with cancer. He wanted to stay home with our furry babies while I was pet sitting, so I couldn't convince him to go to the hospital. He was sure he would be fine. By February, he was so much worse; he was admitted to the hospital against his wishes. With his compromised immune system working against him, Vito couldn't hold on anymore, and died on March 16th. I took Macy to see him his last few days at the Unity Hospice Care Center. She was a great comfort to both of us, and he got to tell her goodbye. One of my final memories I have is Macy's chin lying on his bed, Vito petting her & the huge smile on his face!

Now, as I learn how to live as a single person, I also have to learn how to make all the decisions, repairs, updates, and improvements alone. Security isn't an issue, I have Macy for that (do you KNOW Macy? Tee hee...). I have my vigilant watch cats, Shey, the rumbling wheezing bully of the house, and Sarena, my blind (and now partially deaf) black sweetheart of a girl, Sammy, who will purr you into a false sense of security, and Shaney, who protects me from whatever may be hiding under the bed.



But it's not easy, I have learned, making all the decisions on my own. While Vito was a good man who loved me more than anyone, he wasn't a good financial planner. I have to adjust my life accordingly.

In the spring, I discovered a SNAKE in my basement. Do you know me? Do you know how I feel about snakes? (And spiders since we are in the fear topic!). My first concern was that it would hurt my cats. I was assured my cats would more likely hurt it, but I blocked the cellar door completely, just in case. I will spend extra time comforting your lonely pets, playing with them, and petting while they eat. I alert owners to any changes that may affect the overall well-being of their animal. My experiences include cats, dogs, birds, gerbils, rabbits, hamsters, salt water and fresh water fish, and almost any other living pets (except the previously mentioned snakes, or spiders!). I pay attention to your home environment to make sure everything is safe, secure, and in the condition I found it.
